



WASHINGTON AND THE WORLD IN FLUX

I have worked in and around Congress for more than 40 years. What is going on now in

Congress reminds me of my two college buddies who decided during Spring Break that they would hop trains for a week, often recklessly, not knowing where they would end up. With critical issues before Congress – funding for all government programs or face a government shutdown, funding for Ukraine and now Israel, reauthorization of the farm bill, implementation of climate change regulations and significant energy policy changes – there is no telling, like my buddies on the trains many years ago, when and how these issues will be resolved.

For IL LICA members and all LICA members, the reauthorization of the farm bill and the impact of the Inflation Reduction Act potentially present the most promise for the land improvement sector market.

Status of Farm Bill Reauthorization

Limited floor time for debate and bill consideration is a common rationale for Congress not to consider must-pass bills like the appropriations and farm bills. The unexpected leadership battle in the House – hopefully resolved by the time you are reading this – has delayed the House from formally meeting. Now, the tragic war in the Middle East will push other issues to the back burner as the Administration and the Congress determine the best response.

The previous farm bill expired Sept. 30, and its renewal, a process that occurs every five years, remains "in the drafting stage," according to Hill staff. Senate Ag Committee leaders continue to focus on drafting a bill. Most observers believe, with her announcement not to seek reelection next year, that Senate Ag Committee Chair Debbie Stabenow (D-MI) will be successful in completing action on the farm bill.

The farm bill and long-term government funding are completely different processes, but GOP House majority infighting over appropriations has stalled other priorities. However, no matter who prevails as Speaker of the House, there will be pressure on House members to produce some domestic legislation as the 2024 campaign season starts to heat up.

"All families, including those in rural America, face rising interest rates, high inflation and turbulence in the marketplace," said a Farm Bureau representative recently. "The farm bill provides certainty to those who grow this nation's food, fuel and fiber and is crucial to ensuring a safe and affordable food supply. Congress has always come through on a farm bill, and they must do it again. Every family in America is counting on it."

The 2018 farm bill was not signed into law until Dec. 20 of that year, so I am optimistic that internal forces within the Congress will drive action on the farm bill this year.

Impact of Inflation Reduction Act Funds

Federal construction and agriculture programs received somewhat of an unexpected gift late last year with the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act.


Over the last century, the Illinois growing season has lengthened by about two weeks while the climate has become 10 percent wetter—changes that are expected to continue in the coming decades. Illinois now experiences more extreme rainfall events followed by more dry spells. These can lead to planting delays, soil compaction, nutrient losses, and the need for replanting. Illinois is also experiencing greater humidity, which promotes plant diseases, pests, and fungus.

The Inflation Reduction Act includes:

- \$20 billion for climate-smart farming conservation programs that farmers already utilize—but are underfunded with demand far exceeding available funds
- Nearly \$10 billion to help rural electric cooperatives invest in more clean/renewable electricity generation, which will help co-ops meet climate goals while expanding affordable clean energy to more rural households
- \$2 billion to increase USDA grants that can help rural small businesses and farming operations make important and affordable clean energy upgrades to their operations, including solar, wind, and energy efficiency
- \$500 million for ethanol and biodiesel storage and dispensing, so that more drivers have a choice instead of just gasoline at the pump; choices mean more competition in fuels and that reduces our dependence on foreign oil
- Expanded tax credits for biofuels which will spur them to become even lower carbon than they already are—and helps expand the use of biofuels beyond only cars and trucks to future aircraft fuels

The funds from the *Inflation Reduction Act* will provide farmers with incentives to improve conservation practices that can cut expenses like fertilizer applications while adopting carbon reduction practices such as expanding cover crops and reducing nitrogen runoff—all of which will increase the value of corn and soybeans in future markets. Illinois USDA will reportedly expand the following programs: Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), Agriculture Conservation Easement Program (ACEP), and Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP).

My train hopping friends returned safely and pursued successful medical careers post college. Congress must get on board and find the resolve to unify and show strength in these turbulent times. Passing the farm bill this year provides them with an opportunity to impact every American's life.

Send all your friends home with to-go containers filled with leftovers.



TERRAIN ZONES: A QGIS PLUGIN FOR THE CREATION OF ELEVATION ZONES FOR SUBIRRIGATION DESIGN




Figure 1. Drainage system in subirrigation mode (after Brown et al., 1997)

Subsurface irrigation (subirrigation), also known as seepage irrigation, is the process of supplying supplemental water (irrigating) below the soil surface through drip lines or drainage tile. The same tiles that are used for drainage can be used for subirrigation by introducing water upstream of a control structure (Figure 1). The objective is to raise the water table near to the plant root zone, so that water flows upward into the root zone by capillary action and is absorbed by the growing media, where permanent shallow water tables already exist.

The design of subsurface systems is outlined in NRCS Practice Standard 443

(https://www.nrcs.usda.gov/sites/default/files/2022-09/Irrigation System Surface And Subsurface 443 NHCP CP S.pdf)

Among other requirements is that "control structures should be set on elevation intervals not to exceed 1 foot." In other words, the elevation difference in a zone regulated by a control structure should not exceed one foot. There is a similar requirement for control zones for drainage water management outlined in NRCS Practice Standard 554 (https://www.nrcs.usda.gov/sites/default/files/2023-08/554 NHCP CPS Drainage Water Management 2023.pdf)

For this practice, the elevation difference in a zone should not exceed two feet.

To help visualize and create control zones for subirrigation or drainage water management, we have developed a new QGIS processing plugin tool called "Terrain Zones." This new tool can be used to create elevation zones with elevation differences of 0.5ft, 1.0 ft, 1.5 ft, and 2.0 ft from a digital elevation model (DEM). The graphical user interface (GUI) for the routine is shown in Figure 2. The "DEM Height Exaggeration" field in the GUI is a parameter used to visually exaggerate small elevation differences in the DEM. The result is plots of subirrigation terrain zones and a hill shade for the main raster DEM layer.




Figure 3. Example control zones with one-foot elevation intervals created by Terrain Zones

An example of one-foot control zones created by the routine is shown in Figure 3, with superimposed contours. The zones are slightly offset from the contour lines because the default base value for the zones is the lowest elevation in the DEM, which

may not be a whole number. In this case the lowest elevation was 697.88 feet, resulting in the offset. The routine can be adjusted so that the user can specify the base value.

These control zone maps are easy to create and can be used as base maps when laying out subirrigation systems. They can also be used in the design of other water management practices, such as drainage water management, as mentioned earlier. Terrain Zones may be installed with the QGIS Plugin Manager, or downloaded from the Illinois Drainage Guide.




Figure 2. Graphical User Interface of the Subirrigation Terrain Zones Plugin

Grounding is a practice that can help you manage experiences such as flashbacks, unwanted memories or negative emotions. These techniques involve focusing on the present to distract yourself from anxiety and other challenging emotions.

You can practice soothing techniques by picturing the face of someone you love, repeating compassionate phrases about yourself, spending time with your pet, visualizing your favorite place or listing positive things.

Conclusion

Grounding techniques can help you manage unpleasant experiences like distress, anxiety, traumatic nightmares and flashbacks. Try these exercises to reduce distress when you first start to feel negative emotions.

Try These Mood-boosting Activities
